Plea to Abolish 5-Year MLIS Course

A joint deputation of IASLIC and BLA, comprising of Dr. Barun Mukherji, President, IASLIC; Dr. Shyamal Roychoudhury, President, Bengal Library Association; Prof. S B Banerjee, Vice-President, IASLIC; Dr. J N Satpathi, former President of IASLIC, Shri R K Saha, former President of BLA; and Prof. Arjun Dasgupta, former Vice-President of IASLIC, waited upon the honorable Vice-chancellor, University of Calcutta, Kolkata, on March 9, 2015, and submitted the following representation requesting him to take necessary steps to do away with the unspecified and irrational 5-year integrated MLIS course being run by the university, immediately:

Subject: 5-Year integrated MLIS degree course at Calcutta University

Respected Sir,

Your kind attention is invited to the UGC's Notification No F.5-1/13(CPP-II), dated 21 August 2014, and its Gazette Notification, dated 5 July 2014, specifying the nomenclatures of the degrees to be offered by the universities. Your kind attention is also invited to the letter No 844-Edn(U)/1U(C)-65/2011, dated 24 October, 2011 (copy enclosed) from the Department of Higher Education, Government of West Bengal, seeking some information from the university with regard to the introduction of the 5-year integrated MLIS course only in the University of Calcutta despite the fact that the course was not within the specified courses of the UGC.

This Association, IASLIC, the national professional society in the field of Library and Information Science and Services and a representative organization in the country reiterates that:

- 1. This 5-year integrated MLIS course will complicate the present LIS education in West Bengal in particular and in the country in general;
- 2. This 5-year integrated MLIS course will aggravate already existing unemployment in the field;
- 3. This course in LIS is not considered as the prescribed qualification for employment in any sector and as such employment opportunity for the new degree holders will be negligible;
- 4. Since LIS is unlike other professional subjects like medical, engineering, accountancy, legal, etc. there is no scope for its practising independently;
- 5. Since LIS is a supporting subject to aid and assist the academicians, scholars, researchers, doctors, engineers, technologists, administrators, planners, decision makers, corporate managers, etc. relevant and compatible knowledge of the basic subjects, at least at the level of the Honours/Masters degree, if not more, is a must for any LIS professional to assist any user of a library qualitatively. Entry of any person in the 5-year integrated MLIS course, just after passing 10+2 course, will make one ineffective, imbecile and infructuous;
- 6. The UGC's Notification cited above also clearly indicates that at the entry of B Lib Sc/B Lib I Sc, Bachelor's degree is the minimum eligible qualification and B Lib Sc or B Lib I Sc is the minimum eligibility qualification for M Lib Sc/M Lib I Sc degree. The UGC has clearly stated in its notification cited above that "Universities awarding unspecified degrees will attract appropriate stringent action."
- 7. The Curriculum Development Committee of the UGC has also not recommended introduction of 5-year integrated MLIS course.

The National Conferences of the IASLIC held in different parts of the country have been raising protest against this unspecified MLIS course introduced in the University of Calcutta. Besides, the convention organized by this Association and the BLA (Bengal Library Association), the representative bodies in the field of LIS profession, in 2010, also protested against this irrational course.

You would appreciate that it is imperative to dispense with any experimentation that may create adverse impact not only on the higher education in the country but also on the profession, breaking away from the all-India pattern of the LIS education in the country. May we, therefore, request your goodself to take necessary steps to do away with carrying on with this unspecified and irrational 5-year integrated MLIS course immediately?

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Bibliometrics Expert Committee, Government of India, New Delhi, and Prof. Shyamal Roychoudhury, President, Bengal Library Association, Kolkata, were the guests of honour. Shri K K Banerjee, Advisor, National Mission on Libraries, delivered the keynote address. The inaugural function was presided over by Prof. K P Mazumder, Professor, DLIS, Jadavpur University, Kolkata.

Prof. Das Purakayastha, in his inaugural address, said that availability of knowledge was a pre-condition for any development. He hailed the role of librarian in preserving and disseminating knowledge. Prof. B K Sen said that dissemination of information was easier than dissemination of knowledge and that knowledge dissemination was a challenge to the library professionals. Dr. Shyamal Roychoudhury, in his address, mentioned about the background of setting up the National Mission on Libraries and its objectives and functioning. In his presidential address, Prof. K P Mazumder wanted to know the progress and modus operandi of different schemes undertaken by NML. He specially stressed the need for setting up the Indian Institute of Library & Information Science. Shri K K Banerjee, in his keynote address, mentioned about the four main areas in which NML was working, viz., setting up of National Virtual Library of India, development of NML model libraries, qualitative and quantitative survey of libraries and capacity building, and narrated the progress made in each area.

During five invited paper presentation sessions, Prof B K Sen; Shri Abhijit Bhowmik, Librarian, State Central Library, Kolkata; Dr. S C Biswas, Professor, DLIS, University of Burdwan, Burdwan; Dr. S B Ghosh, Retired Professor, IGNOU, New Delhi; Shri S B Banerjee, Vice-President, IASLIC; Dr. Ratna Bandyopadhyay, Professor, DLIS, University of Calcutta, Kolkata; and Prof. Amitabha Chatterjee, Retired Professor, DLIS, Jadavpur University, Kolkata, presented their papers. In seven technical sessions, altogether 37 contributed papers, out of 86 accepted, were presented by respective authors/co-authors.

The valedictory session was chaired by Shri S B Banerjee. In this session the Rapporteur General of the seminar, Prof. Amitabha Chatterjee, presented the report on the proceedings of the various sessions, while the valedictory address of Prof. Chaitali Dutta of DLIS, Jadavpur University, Kolkata, was read out by Smt. Nivedita Bhattacharyya Sahoo of DLIS, Vidyasagar University, as Dr. Dutta could not attend the seminar due to sudden illness. Four resolutions pleading early constitution of a permanent and autonomous National Commission on Libraries, creation of a Central Library Fund, setting up of the Indian Institute of Library and Information Science, and bringing library services in the concurrent list of the Indian Constitution, were unanimously adopted. The seminar was attended by 99 delegates, 40 students and 12 resource persons. Prof. Durga Shankar Rath and Dr. Bidyarthi Dutta served as joint conveners of the seminar.

The total collection is over 12,5,000 from 600-plus publishers. There is a fairly large collection of textbooks too. After recent tie-ups with DC Books, Malayalam Manorama , Mathrubhumi and Green Books, Rockstand now offers the largest ecollection in Malayalam. Quite a lot of free fare is on offer and even the paid e-titles are reasonably priced at a fraction of the print edition cost. Trend of Fake Reading

According to a report published in *Deccan Herald*, dated February 17, 2015, fake reading is an emerging trend in metros across the country. Many Indians buy books to decorate their homes, some buy it to impress their prospective partners. In fact, people like to fake read in public places, finds a recent survey on reading habits. The survey, conducted in seven cities in the country, showed that several people who buy classics never read them. Called the 'Fakespeare Survey', Landmark Stores, a Tata enterprise, undertook such a survey for the first time to map the reading habits of people. According to Sivaraman Balakrishnan, Senior Manager (Marketing and Communication), Landmark Stores, while a plenty of surveys had been done to look into what books people buy, this one aimed at looking into why people were buying certain books. The responses elicited from the readers showed that about 23 per cent of people did fake reading to impress potential partners, while about 13 per cent purchased books to decorate their homes. Not just homes, about 10 per cent of people bought books as an accessory, merely to complete their outfit. Ltd., Bangalore, gave a lecture under Faculty Development Programme, on 'Information explosion, e-resources and their impact on academics and research work' on January 29, 2015, at Global Academy of Technology, Bangalore. Shri Satyanarayana mentioned about the proliferation of information resources in various formats. Internet had speeded up both growth and dissemination of information to the end users, he said. He stressed the need for browsing e-resources, particularly e-journals, on continuous basis to keep oneself up-to-date in the field of science and engineering. Shri D V Patwardhan, Sr. Librarian, explained the efforts made by the library to provide state-of-the art web based services to his colleagues. Prof. B R Venkatesh, Vice-Principal, proposed a vote of thanks. The programme was attended by more than 250 faculty members.

A Font and a Dictionary for Dyslexics

A Dutch designer Christian Boer has created a font to help dyslexic readers navigate text, designing letters in a way that avoids confusion and adds clarity, while in England, two researchers are compiling a dictionary that favors meaning over alphabetical order. To avoid confusion, Boer designed letters that have a heavier bottom half, making it less likely that a reader might flip them. He also made some openings larger, and slightly tilted some letters that closely resemble others - such as a "b" and a "d." The new font also incorporates more space between letters and words, to help prevent a dyslexic reader from seeing a confused jumble of text. Instead of using a strict alphabetical order, words in their dictionary will be organized according to their meanings, as the British researchers explained in a recent article in British newspaper the Litchfield Mercury. So far, nearly 50,000 words have been organized sorting them by some 3,700 morphemes, they said. Loss of Film Magazine Archive Feared

According to a report published in Mumbai Mirror, rare books, old film magazines and other texts - part of the collection of Sangeet Natak Academy laureate Sushila Rani Patel and her husband - have become collateral damage in the battle over the late couple's 9,000-sq ft Pali Hill (Mumbai) property, Girnar Bungalow. Sushila Rani Baburao Patel Trust - which has accused the granddaughter of Sushila Rani's husband of illegally taking possession of the property estimated to be worth Rs 100 crore - claims the granddaughter, Geeta Patel-D'Souza, gave away several priceless books to scrap dealers. The trust's chairperson, Neela Shinde, has claimed in a suit filed in the Bombay High Court that so far 59 books and other materials had been recovered from raddiwalas. D'Souza denies discarding the books, one of which was published way back in 1907.
